Welcome

Welcome to this first edition of the monthly electronic newsletter of the Naval Historical Society of Australia, *Call the Hands*. It is a response to demand expressed by members in a survey of needs in early 2016. This initiative augments three paper based newsletters already issued by the Society. These include; *The Buzz* to all members, *Three Headed Dog* for Victorian members and the West Australian Chapter Newsletter. Each fulfils a specific need.

Experience has shown that the Buzz, while a national newsletter, is relatively NSW and Sydney centric. Similarly, its quarterly edition does not allow shorter notice events or issues to be promulgated to members in a timely manner. Thus, the aim of this electronic newsletter is to supplement *The Buzz* by providing members, stakeholders, and other interested parties with up to date news of activities and events with a naval history or related interest.

There is no intention to change the Buzz. It will continue to be distributed quarterly to all members with the Naval Historical Review.

The items covered in *Call the Hands* will be a mix of those specific to the NHSA as well as subjects likely to be of interest to members being conducted by others. This concept is in line with the Committee's aim of growing relationships with like-minded organisations, of which there are many. Similarly, our longer term goal is to put in place reciprocal arrangements for NHSA members with these organisations for mutual benefit.

A final but very important point is that NHSA members are scattered across Australia. As a consequence, members in regional areas do not necessarily have easy access to member events currently conducted in Sydney, Melbourne and Perth. Thus, a two way system of communications is needed so that we in the Boatshed are informed of regional events of interest to members. This information can then be broadcast via *Call the Hands* for the benefit of all. To this end a new e-mail address callthehands@navyhistory.org.au has been created. Please use it when you hear about an event or information of likely interest to members. We want to hear from you.

Naval History Workshop: Canberra: 7 September

The newly established Naval Studies Group at The Australian Centre for the Study of armed conflict (ACSACS) is holding a Naval History Workshop on 7 September 2016.

Members of the Naval Historical Society of Australia have been invited to participate.

The aim of the Naval History Workshop is to bring together a diverse range of people interested in the study and writing of Australian and global naval history. It is the first formal activity of the Naval Studies Group recently established within ACSACS at the University of NSW in Canberra (ADFA). It seeks to span the range of background and expertise from the professional academic to the enthusiastic amateur and identify how we can best cooperate with and support each other. The workshop includes a survey of current research interests, as well as an examination of the requirements and challenges in writing and publishing for both specialists and the popular market.

As there are plenty of previous submissions on file you will not necessarily be reinventing the wheel. Naturally good writing skills are essential.
